Living in a Strange Land Sermon Series January 23-Febuary 27, 2022

We're not the first people to find ourselves living in a strange land. Wherever we are living, God is working. As disciples of Jesus, how do we learn to live in this land from those who have been here before us? All are looking forward into the new land and finding the blessings where they are planted.

January 23, 2022: Living in the Wilderness | Exodus, Numbers 14:1-25

The journey from captivity to the Promised Land taught a generation to trust in God's faithfulness. Living in the wilderness presents challenges to how we navigate relationships with God, others and ourselves. *The tent of meeting was always the focus in the wilderness*.

January 30, 2022: Living in a Strange Land | Jeremiah 29

Exiled to a foreign land, God's vision of living in this land is beyond what anyone would imagine. Wherever we live, God has wisdom for how to order our daily lives.

February 6, 2022: Living in Isolation | Daniel 6

While Daniel lived in a strange land, he maintained his integrity. Even when pushed to abandon his faith Daniel maintained his daily discipline. When a strange land pressures us to conform we need to maintain our spiritual habits to thrive.

February 13, 2022: Living in Community | Nehemiah 6

You can never go back to the old way of living. When the Exiles returned to Jerusalem, they found a common purpose and a common faith to build a new way of living together in a strange land.

February 20, 2022: Living in New Places | Acts 8:1-8; 11:19-26

Persecution sent the early disciples into new communities. COVID-19 can send the church into new communities where God is already preparing the soil for harvest.

February 27, 2022: Living in a New Kingdom | 1 Peter 2:9-12; Philippians 3:20-21

As disciples of Jesus, we are living in a strange land that is not our final home. How we live daily is a testimony to our journey as foreigners and strangers in this strange land. *The H.S. and Kingdom of God is within us. Music: Where I Belong.*

February News from Finance

Good Shepherd friends it is the month of Love! Love for one another, love for our family and most of all God's Love for us. We are reminded that no matter the events in our lives such as pandemics, losses of loved ones, loneliness or just plain winter blues, God is always with us and loving us even more. We all love our own beautiful church home and the memories we cherish through events and spiritual gifts we have received through messages that touched us personally.

How do we ever recognize and support the gifts of love we have received? We attend and support our church with our presence and our monetary support. We take care of our property. I have seen or known of many who give of their time to care for the church in many ways from the rose garden to the kitchen, from the snow plowing and sidewalk shoveling to the sanctuary.

Speaking of the sanctuary we are all aware of our old furnace dying. We are in mourning since we cannot hold services of any type in the beloved sanctuary. Yes, we are very blessed to have Bruce Chapel to hold worship in (when Covid is not running about). We are limited to smaller numbers in Bruce Chapel, and we cannot have proper social distancing.

I have shared with you every month that our current giving is short of our monthly expenses in the General Fund. At the end of 2021 the shortfall is \$11,900. We are currently paying all personnel expenses and monthly operational costs. We struggle to pay timely any extra maintenance expenses and we are 6 months behind in paying our Mission Shares to the conference. It will take extra mile giving to begin to think of a furnace replacement.

The one estimate we have right now for replacing our sanctuary furnace is \$42,000. We need to raise nearly all of this prior to accepting any estimate or bid obligation. Most of you will recall the \$40,000 expense we recently incurred to replace the roof. In order to pay for it we refinanced the mortgage on the church and borrowed additional funds for the roof. It does not seem reasonable to borrow again so soon for the furnace replacement.

All donations for furnace replacement will be managed with separate accounting and in the Specials bank account which is separate from the General Fund. If you have the ability to give beyond your normal support of the church and want to be part of this special sanctuary furnace replacement project, we are very grateful for your generosity. Please mark your checks or donations for "Furnace Replacement".

Since we are temporarily meeting via Zoom until the virus settles down, please mail your monthly contributions to the church or stop by during Monday or Wednesday office hours normally from 9 am to 1 pm. We'll be collecting items for the first three months of 2022. We do have some things on hand, but we need these items:


- Hand towels (15 X 25 up to 17 X 27) any color

Looking Ahead







Black History Month 2022 Theme
